CENTER FOR ARTS AND AGRICULTURE

Located in a renovated building on Placerville's historic Main Street and made possible by a unique public-private partnership with the City of Placerville, the Center will offer a year-round roster of exhibitions, performances, workshops and special events to an under-resourced rural community.

Amenities will include a teaching kitchen, gallery/demonstration space, and rooftop garden.

The Center will offer cultural amenities unique and authentic to El Dorado County, with events, exhibitions, demonstrations, and film series, including:

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

Special programs will focus on farmworkers and families, career pathways, and issues of diversity, equity, and inclusion in local culture.





Partnerships with local farms and wineries, restauranteurs, artist groups, and educational institutions will enable the Center to reach a wide range of audiences and participants.









LOOKING AHEAD

Northern California is a major business hub and a destination for tourists from across the globe. El Dorado County, with its quaint, rustic towns, wineries, and recreational activities, is poised to expand significantly in the coming years.

The Center for Arts and Agriculture is one element of a planned Cultural District that will include exhibition space, artist live-work studios, community cultural center, performance space, and administrative offices.

This project is ambitious but has the backing of business, government and the cultural community, and is well-positioned to make a significant impact regionally, nationally and internationally.

PROJECT LEADERSHIP






